On December 12 the Board met and conducted the following business:

- Approved the minutes of the November 14 meeting.
- Heard the monthly report: Attendance 66.7%. Administrative hours 67. Service hours 50. The

majority of the hours were for Meals on Wheels and Gerry Keener did 14 hours for Habitat For Humanity.

- Agreed to give Helen Baxter the December Board Thank You Award for being a long time member of the Club and participating in a multitude of our service projects.
- Agreed to allow Eileen Sanders to rent the sound system for \$20 for an event on February 4.

## January

On January 9 the Board met and conducted the following business:

- Approved the minutes of the December 12 Board meeting and the general meeting of the Club on December 22.
- Heard the monthly report: Attendance 53.3%. Administrative hours 37. Service hours 207. 97 hours were for Ringing Bells for the Salvation Army. This included the hours for several Key Club members from Harrisburg and Churchill.
- Accepted the Treasurer's report: \$500 was donated to Mt. Pisgah. Bob Sanders is working on a problem with the Accounts Plus program. This program has been used for several years and all of a sudden they want a password and there never was one. It may cost us some money to be able to get back into the program.
- It was decided to continue collecting money in the birthday cans to offset the money in the budget for the International and the District Foundations. More education concerning the cans will be done.
- With the unusual weather that we are having it was agreed that we should have a policy concerning cancelling the meetings. "When the 4J School District closes schools due to the weather our meeting will also be cancelled and the President will inform Laurelwood of the decision. If the 4J schools are on a 2 hour delay, the President will contact Laurelwood to see if the road is passable and then inform members of the decision to either cancel the meeting or hold it as scheduled".
- Greg Christy is in charge of the Facebook page and hopes to include pictures frequently.
- It was agreed that there would be no outside speaker at the Youth Recognition Banquet on April 25.
